<u>CONDITIONS for POT PLANTS:</u> Pot Plants need to have been owned by the Exhibitor for a minimum of six (6) Calendar months prior to exhibiting. Pots must be clean.

- a. Pots not to exceed 60cms unless otherwise stated
- **b.** Plants must be DISTINCT unless otherwise stated
- c. Exhibits of inferior quality not necessarily awarded a prize
- **d.** Only the plant to be judged in the pot (no weeds or decorative under planting)

- e. Pots are to be free of livestock eg. mealy bug, aphid & snails
- f. If an exhibit is staged with a contaminant it will be removed or asked to be removed

CUT FLOWERS

CONDITIONS for CUT FLOWERS:

- **a.** All exhibits in this Section MUST be grown by the exhibitor. Community groups may exhibit under community group name.
- **b.** All exhibitors must stage exhibits in the spaces allotted, otherwise entries will be disqualified.
- **c.** Cuts must be distinct unless otherwise specified.
- **d.** Exhibits can be moved at the discretion of the head steward.
- e. Exhibits of inferior quality not necessarily awarded a prize.
- f. Dead leaves removed
- g. No leaves to be inside tubes

Tips for Exhibiting Cut Flowers - ROSES:

- Distinct means different cultivars
- A bloom one flower on a stem
- A stem is a stem bearing two or more flowers
- Exhibition Rose formal with tight bud centre
- Bud 1 or 2 petals unfurling
- Roses to be named where possible
- Roses can be staged with leaves attached to the stem as long as they do not touch the water

Cut Flowers – Irises

Tips for Exhibiting Cut Flowers BEARDED IRIS:

- Flowers to be evenly spaced on stems
- Flowers on alternate sides
- Second bloom/bud from top not to touch stem (Space to allow bloom to open without being damaged)
- Stem is a single stalk with no side shoots
- Spray has side shoots and multiple heads of flowers (floribunda rose)
- Make sure that shades are distinct so that you definitely have the specified number of flowers in different colours e.g. 6 different pansies/violas

DUTCH IRIS:

- The three top standards should come together at the top
- The three falls at the bottom should be evenly spaced
- Avoid staging double irises, as these are the same as exhibiting two irises in the same tube

Cut Flowers - Flowers

Tips for Exhibiting Cut Flowers - CUT FLOWERS:

- No leaves to be below the top of the test tube (this will disqualify the exhibit)
- Carnations and Pansies to be staged on a white card disk approx. 5cm (2") diameter. Use a glass or cup to trace around. Place a hole in the middle for the stem to be threaded through.
- Only one stem in each tube for each cut bloom.
- Plugs of arum lily will be available from the Horticultural Stewards to help secure the exhibit in staging place plug behind the stem of the exhibit.
- Put the best view of the exhibit towards the judge.
- Dead leaves removed.
- When staging groups of flowers use these rules:
- a) Darkest flower to the back, lightest at the front.
- b) Highest flower at the back, shortest flower at the front
- Water damaged blooms should be avoided.
- Where any stem has a flower and bud this rule applies: a) Where there is any colour visible on the bud, the bud shall be viewed as a bloom and will be disqualified as exhibiting two blooms in one container.
- Daisy exhibits should be on 15cms stems, no foliage or buds attached.
- Grasses or foliage are not to be staged with seedpods, buds or flowers.

SPIRE FLOWERS: (Includes delphiniums, hollyhocks, snapdragons and gladioli)

- The following ratio should apply to each bloom
- 1/3 stem, 1/3 open flowers, 1/3 /buds.
- Flowers to be evenly spaced over stem along/around the spire.
- No seed pods or spent blooms on spire.

Vegetables

CONDITIONS for VEGETABLES:

- a. All vegetables must be grown solely by Exhibitor.
- **b.** Produce should be even in appearance with smooth skin and without blemishes.
- **c.** Exhibits of inferior quality not necessarily awarded a prize.
- **d.** Produce will be judged on size and quality most suitable for home use.
- **e.** Display is important; use medium size paper plates where there are several articles in a class
- e.g. Lemons or oranges use a few nice clean leaves.
- **f.** Jars will be provided where necessary.
- **g.** Horticultural material anything found in/on a farm for "farming".
- **h.** Exhibits can be moved at the discretion of the head steward.

Tips for Exhibiting

VEGETABLES:

- Not all leaf removed from rhubarb
- Heritage vegetables are those vegetables that are not commercially grown today.
